

Police Offense Codes

Assault--Agg--D/W

The person committing an assault either causes serious bodily injury or uses/displays a deadly weapon. 2nd degree felony

Burglary--Bldg

This involves anyone entering a building by any means (locked, unlocked, reaching in a window...) and taking property without the owner's permission. A building is anything from a business to a backyard shed to a home under construction not lived in yet. State jail felony

Burglary--Hab

A person enters a home without permission to commit a felony, a theft or an assault. 2nd degree felony

Burglary--Hab--(Crim Att)

Nothing was stolen, but the police officer can say the person was trying to break in to steal something. 3rd degree felony

Burglary--Veh

Anyone entering a vehicle by any means (locked, unlocked, reaching in a window...) and takes property without the owner's permission. Class A misdemeanor

Burglary--Veh-(Crim. Att.)

Police officer determines someone did more than just break a window, that they entered the car and rummaged through the car or tried to pry the radio out of the dash but nothing appears to be stolen.

Criminal Mischief

This involves doing any damage to someone else's property that causes at least \$5 loss to fix or inconvenience to clean up. Examples are breaking a window, keying a car, spray painting graffiti, egging. Like theft, the value of loss determines the level of offense.

Robbery--Indv.

In the process of stealing from a person, the suspect causes or threatens bodily injury. 2nd degree felony

Robbery--Agg--Indv.

While committing robbery, the suspect causes serious bodily injury, uses/displays weapon, or simply causes injury to the victim and the victim is 65 or older or disabled at any age. 1st degree felony

Theft--Vehicle (Unmotorized)

Usually used for stealing things like trailers, which have no motor.

Theft--All Other

Includes shoplifting, a theft from the outside of a car (i.e. hubcaps), stealing something out of a yard or numerous other examples. The monetary loss determines the level of offense, which can range from a ticket to a felony.

Unauthorized Use Motor Vehicle

This involves a person stealing a motorized vehicle without permission. Examples of motorized vehicles are boats, airplanes and mopeds. State jail felony
