At our most recent meeting the board renewed its commitment to serving and helping the people who elected us. We want our members to know we will work with you to help get through tough situations when possible. It seems safe to say that all of us have at one time or another hit a rough time or two, whether of a financial or a personal nature. Communities pull together to help each other make it through those, so here are a couple of ways the board thinks it can help.



First and foremost, open a line of communications. The notorious B.O.A.R.D. is nothing more than a collection of your neighbors who serve (some quite reluctantly) for no pay and a desire to help. Visit the web site, start a Discussion topic or send a note to the community email address. Just reach out – we can't help that of which we aren't aware.

Second, add your name to the Helping Hands Project. Neighbors helping neighbors is the best defense our community has against letting our friends slip through the cracks in their time of need. Find the topic "[Neighborhood assistance](#)" on the Discussion board and hit Reply to throw your skill into the hat.

And finally, the board has initiated temporary permitting to ease the process of getting short-term relief from Association sanctions for storage violations in an emergency. To request a permit, email TheVillas.HOA@att.net and include your name, your address, the length of time you'll need relief and the reason for your request. If approved, you will be issued a temporary permit for no more than six months, which is valid so long as all permit requirements are met. A limit of five percent of homeowner lots will be granted a permit at the same time.
