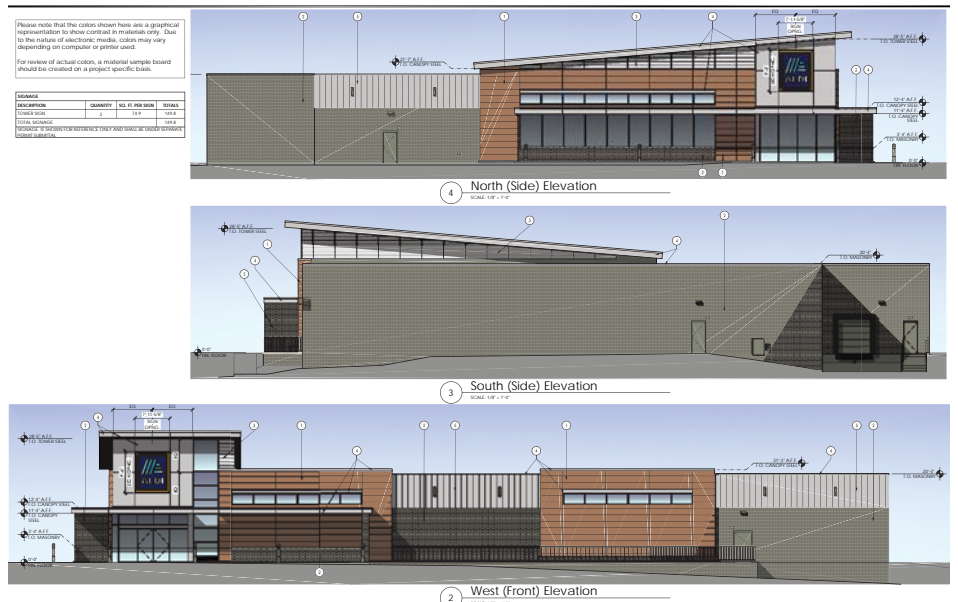

## 9 Overlooked Spring Cleaning Jobs

With winter finally leaving and warmer weather on the way, it’s time to tackle all that spring cleaning! It can be a lengthy process but it’s important that you don’t miss these often overlooked steps.

### Exterior Jobs

Winter can be rough on the exterior of your home. So you should start on the exterior before the spring rains cause more problems.

1. Clean out the gutters of any debris leftover from the winter storms and check to make sure your gutters are still securely fastened.
2. Clear away all the debris from your exterior drains. This will allow the heavy spring rains to properly flow and prevent back ups.
3. Check your windows for any cracking or splitting from the caulk. If so, clean off the mildew and replace the caulk.
4. The warming weather will inevitably lead to outdoor entertaining, so don’t

forget to clean off your patio furniture using a mild soap and warm water. Gently scrub away any dirt that has collected over the winter. If you have wrought iron and rust has started forming, gently sand it off.

Now, wipe off your shoes and head inside.

5. Unplug your refrigerator, slide it away from the wall and vacuum the dust that has accumulated on the condenser coils. This task may seem small, but can greatly extend the life of your refrigerator
6. Vacuum out the dust that is sticking to your air vents. After the vents are clear of dust, apply a thin layer of car wax on all surfaces of the vent to prevent dust from sticking and to allow for easier airflow.

Call in the Pros

There are still a few things left that should be done by professionals.

7. If you built a lot of fires over the winter, have a CSIA-Certified chimney sweep inspect your chimney and fireplace. This should be done annually to prevent housefires. As a bonus tip, throw a handful of salt into a fire to prevent soot and add some color to the flame!

8. Have a contractor certified by National Roofing Contractors Association inspect your roof for any missing, warped or loose shingles and check for loose seals on your skylights.

9. Before the weather warms up too much, have your HVAC system inspected by a qualified technician and, if needed, replace your filters.

Now that you’ve checked these jobs off your list, you can start enjoying the spring!

# Pets and Cold Weather

Winter isn't officially over for almost two months so it is important that we stay diligent to ensure the safety of our companion animals when they are outside.

Follow these tips to keep winter fun and safe for you and your pet:

Towel dry your dog as soon you bring them inside and pay special attention to the feet and space between the toes, removing any snow balls that may have formed.

Keep your dog's hair longer in the winter to provide more warmth. Minor trims to minimize ice balls, salt crystals, and de-icing chemicals are all they need right now.

Keep a towel with you on longer walks so you can wipe down their paws and after each walk wash and dry your pet's feet and stomach to remove ice, salt and chemicals.

Reduce the number of baths during cold weather to combat dry, flaky skin.

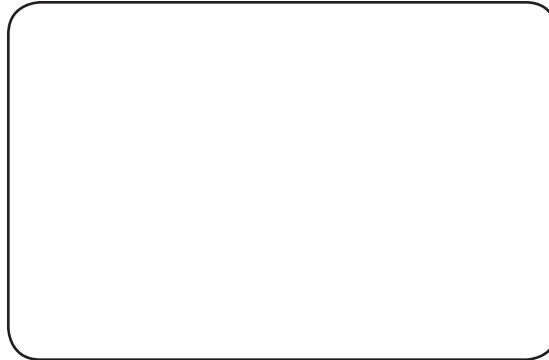
Consider massaging petroleum jelly or other paw protectants into paw pads before going on walks to protect against ice and salt on the sidewalks.

Antifreeze is a lethal poison for dogs and cats so be sure to thoroughly clean up any spills from your vehicle, and consider using products that contain propylene glycol rather than ethylene glycol.

Make sure your fur kid has a warm place to sleep, off the floor and away from all drafts. A cozy dog or cat bed with a warm blanket or pillow is almost as good as sleeping in bed with you!

Remember, if it's too cold for you, it's probably too cold for your pet, so on days the temperature dips find other ways to keep your dog entertained inside the home or consider taking them to a pet-friendly store such as Home Depot for their daily stimulation.

Remember, cold weather can be deadly for pets so if you see a pet left out in the cold, speak out. Pets left outside in extreme temperatures, especially without food, fresh and unfrozen water,



and adequate shelter, are at risk of hypothermia, frostbite, and even death.

Ohio Code states that no person shall:

(1) Torture an animal, deprive one of necessary sustenance, unnecessarily or cruelly beat, needlessly mutilate or kill, or impound or confine an animal ***without supplying it during such confinement with a sufficient quantity of good wholesome food and water;***

(2) ***Impound or confine an animal without affording it, during such confinement, access to shelter from wind, rain, snow, or excessive direct sunlight if it can reasonably be expected that the animals would otherwise become sick or in some other way suffer.*** Division (A)(2) of this section does not apply to animals impounded or confined prior to slaughter. For the purpose of this section, shelter means a man-made enclosure, windbreak, sunshade, or natural windbreak or sunshade that is developed from the earth's contour, tree development, or vegetation.

If you suspect abuse, talk to the owner immediately and politely inform them of the problem and how they can rectify it. Oftentimes, neglect can be attributed to lack of knowledge so don't assume the person is being cruel. Take the time to educate others but, if necessary, be prepared to contact law enforcement.

# Gardening Groundwork

Although winter is still upon us, there are many gardening preparations that can make the growing season easier.

Take advantage of any unseasonably warm days and check your gardening beds for any damage and make or plan for repairs as needed.

Those warmer days are also great to prune bushes and shrubs while they are still dormant.
