Garbage Pick-Up is on Mon. and Thurs, around 7 a.m. Everyone should always take garbage out on those days, versus leaving in the trash can for another day, because of the raccoon concerns. Provide your renters with secure garbage cans. Spraying with ammonia on the outside of can might help keep raccoons away, but lids must also fit properly. No garbage is allowed in the Recycle Shed. Cardboard needs to be broken down. No styrofoam in recycles.

You must leave a key for renters to open the Clubhouse.

Thank you for your prompt attention to these items. Our winter residents are wonderful people and we know that they will help in keeping our community orderly, but owners must provide them with all of the information that owners have.




Why Community Associations Work A Finding from the CAI Survey

"By their nature, community associations bring people together, strengthen neighborhood bonds and promote a sense of community and belonging— attributes that are often overlooked in a highly transient society. A large percentage of the more than 65 million Americans who make their homes in associations take advantage of association-sponsored activities like holiday events, social clubs, athletic and fitness activities, pool parties and more. These activities help residents get to know their neighbors, forge new and supportive friendships, and build a stronger sense of community."

The 2014 survey was based on an online survey of 800 American adults residing in homeowners associations, condominiums, cooperatives and other planned communities, collectively called "community associations" in this report. Similar national tracking surveys in 2005, 2007, 2009 and 2012 were based on telephone interviews. The 2014 findings track closely with previous survey results, affirming the validity of the online survey. Visit www.caionline.org or call (888)224-4321. Looking for a way to assess the governance-related operations of your community association? Minimally, a quality community association should comply with all of the following statements. Community Associations Institute (CAI) Best Practices Report for Governance, Resident Involvement & Conflict Resolution.

- There is a functioning board that meets regularly and that is carrying out its duties and responsibilities as prescribed by applicable laws and governing documents.
- The board has disclosed to the owners the association information that is required by law and the governing documents.
- The association's legal documents, resolutions, books and records are kept in a location that is open to inspection by owners on reasonable notice during regular business hours.
- Owners may attend board meetings, except when the board meets in executive session.
- The board provides for due process (the opportunity to be heard) for owners in association-related matters and the board encourages the use of alternative dispute resolution in appropriate matters.
- The board conducts, and produces minutes of, an annual owners meeting as required by the governing documents.
- Election procedures conform to the governing documents and applicable law, with information regarding the process available to all owners.
- A system is in place to respond to owners' requests for association maintenance and for other association-related matters.
- A system is in place for property inspections and monitoring to ensure proper maintenance and appearance, both current and preventive.
- The board communicates with the owners periodically to provide information concerning the association and to get feedback from the owners.
- There exists a mechanism and procedure for assuring residents' obligations to adhere to the governing documents, and a confidential and safe forum for the resolution of disputes.
- Management is licensed, certified or holds appropriate credentials evidencing its competence to manage the community.











Flourless Egg Muffins

Broccoli, peppers, veggies of your choice
Spinach
Green onion
Chopped tomatoes
Cheese, ricotta, or other
Green chillies
Fresh coriander
You can add chicken or other lean meats
Eggs 6 beaten with 2 tbsp milk and black pepper to taste.

Preheat oven at 200C
Grease a muffin tin
Add vegetables and cheese
Pour beaten egg mixture over it
Place muffin pan on the center rack and bake for 20-25 minutes
or until muffins are light brown, puffy, and the eggs are set.
Let muffins cool for a few minutes before removing.
Loosen gently with knife if they seem to be sticking.
Eat immediately or let cool.
They can be stored in refrigerator and reheated in the microwave.
